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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dr. Ghali College Gadhinglaj was established in 1984 and is governed by Vidya Prasarak Mandal, Gadhinglaj. “*Vidye Vina na Jagruti*” is the vision of the institute. College is known for its high academic standards and its excellent social attitude. It offers a wide variety of 20 Undergraduate and 9 Postgraduate programs. The college emphasizes access to education, gender equity and broadening participation in education. The college is affiliated with Shivaji University, Kolhapur and has 2(f) and 12(B) status with UGC. College has sufficient infrastructure for laboratories, a library and a gymnasium. Students are benefited various scholarships from Central and State Governments, NGOs as well as from Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The institute also provides fee concessions, various other supports for the poor, needy, and sports students. Faculty members adopt the students under "Student Adoption Scheme" in which financial and non-financial support is given to poor and needy students. All students of final year UG and PG do their research projects with the help of various other institutions, industries and NGOs. The College has signed MoUs, collaborations and linkages for the benefit of students and teachers and achieved its milestone with introduction of 9 new programmes and courses, an increase in infrastructure for classes, laboratories, ICT enabled and SMART classrooms, CFC cum incubation center, Commerce Lab, Skill Development Centre and Audio-Video Recording Room etc.

Management is aware of 21st century educational needs, both local and global, and is actively involved in the college's functioning. It takes care of adequate infrastructure for classrooms, library building, sports and cultural facilities, a multipurpose hall, a gymnasium, and digital infrastructure for administration. Admissions and examination processes ensure smooth functioning as per necessity and transitioned towards OBE, evident through students' achievements and performance. The College has received 7 times ‘*Meritorious College*’ Certificate. Qualified and dedicated faculty work towards educational excellence. Co-curricular and extracurricular activities develop talents and inculcate constitutional, democratic, and human values among students. Feedback on institutional services, curricular aspects, teaching, learning, evaluation, and activities conducted, help to continuous improvement. College has significantly contributed to the education of rural and poor communities in the region.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Dr. Ghali College follows the curriculum of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The college ensures effective curriculum implementation following CBCS and NEP patterns. 7 new programmes and courses have been introduced in the college in last five years.

1. Effective curriculum delivery is ensured through an innovative teaching learning process and recorded in Academic Teachers Diary, syllabus completion reports etc. Curricular, Co-curricular activities and continuous internal evaluation is adhered to the College Academic Calendar.
2. 73 Add on /Certificate /Value added programs were offered during the last five years.
3. 67.40 % students enrolled in Certificate/ Add-on/Value added programs as against the total number of students during the last five years.
4. Curriculum of programs is enriched with crosscutting issues like Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability.
5. 56.92% students involve in undertaking project work, field work and internships.
6. Feedback on academic performance and atmosphere of college, taken from various stake holders like Students, Teachers, Employers and Alumni are collected, analyzed and action taken report on the feedback is made available on the institutional website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college focuses on student-centered teaching and learning. To improve student performance, continuous assessment and summative examinations are conducted. Lectures are made more interactive using ICT. Faculties are encouraged to enhance qualifications. The IQAC continuously monitors the Teaching Learning Evaluation (TLE) through various means.

1. On an average 85.40% admissions are filled for in available seat the last 5 years.
2. 51.72 % of seats filled against seats reserved for various categories.
3. Student to full time Teacher ratio is 36.82:1.
4. Student's centric learning through laboratory work, projects, group discussion, students' symposium, surveys and case studies etc.
5. Average 99.65 % of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years.
6. 56.94% of full-time teachers with highest degree like NET/SET/Ph. D./M.Phil. during the last five years. The college proudly counts 16 Ph.D.-holding faculty members, among them 5 are esteemed guides for 16 declared and 14 ongoing Ph.D. students. Furthermore, 14 faculty members are actively engaged in pursuing their own Ph.D.
7. Mechanism of internal and external assessment is transparent and efficient. Under the guidance of the Principal, the College Examination Committee monitors the effective conduct of internal and external examinations. Examination related grievances, if any, are addressed in time-bound manner.
8. Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are displayed on the department notice board and on website for easy access and reference. POs and COs attainment are evaluated through summative

and formative assessment (Direct Method) and student progression, placement records (Indirect Method).

9. The average pass percentage of final year students is 92.19% for the last five years.
10. The institution encourages the students to participate in the online Students Satisfaction Survey (SSS) regarding the teaching learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Dr. Ghali College, Gadhinglaj created good environment to carry out research through projects for students and teachers. Initiatives like the "Research Sensitization Scheme" actively involve students in research projects. Majority of extension programs were organized by the NSS, NCC and Environmental Cell. These include health checkup, blood donation, tree plantation and celebration of various days like AIDs awareness NSS days etc. This practice fulfills the college's social responsibilities.

1. Faculty members submit their research proposals to the affiliated University for Minor Research Grants, and 2 faculties have received Rs. 1.95 lakh.
2. Institution has created an ecosystem through with well-equipped departments and Common Facility Centre (CFC) for innovations and incubation for research. Research and Development Cell monitors and promotes research activities.
3. The college organized 114 workshops, conferences and seminars on research methodology, IPR, and contemporary issues during the assessment period.
4. The faculty members published 53 research papers in UGC approved journals.
5. The faculty members published 63 papers in conference proceedings and 51 in book chapters and books during the assessment period.
6. College conducts extension and outreach programmes through NSS and NCC and interacts with villagers and economically deprived residents from the nearby locality. These activities sensitize social issues for holistic development of students.
7. In last five years the Institution has received 46 awards for extension services.
8. College organized and participated in 153 activities conducted through NSS and NCC.
9. College has signed 33 MOUs, 38 Collaboration and 30 linkages during the last five years for Faculty exchange, Student exchange, Internship, Field trip, On-the- job training, research and other academic activities with 135 activities conducted.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a prime location in the heart of Gadhinglaj city. The Management has carefully created a healthy learning environment on campus with sufficient infrastructure. The college classrooms provided with internet, LCD projector, and interactive boards and has well equipped laboratories as well as good sports facilities. This indicates dedication towards overall growth of students. Every classroom is comfort, offering ample space, excellent ventilation, and abundant natural light, ensuring an optimal setting for immersive learning experiences.

1. Adequate infrastructure and physical facilities, which includes 28 class rooms, 17 labs, 5 Computer Centers, 1 Auditorium Hall and 1 Library, 1 Gym, NSS, NCC, and Cultural rooms, 1 CFC and skill development centre are made available in the campus.
2. Average expenditure, excluding salary for infrastructure augmentation during last five years is 34.35%.

3. Library is enriched with 40,050 books and fully automated using the Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) – “NewGenLib” Software. Learning resources like e-journals, e-Shodh Sindhu, Shodhganga, e-books and remote access to e-resources are made available through Library website.. Annual average expenditure on Library is 1.9 lakhs. There is more than 10% per day usage of the library.
4. The IT facilities both hardware and software’s are updated frequently. The Institute has a Wi-fi facility with 300 mbps and 200 mbps optical fiber connectivity for office and 200 mbps Internet LAN connectivity for classrooms and laboratories. The college has 2 smart classrooms, 6 classrooms with LCD and DLP projectors.
5. Students to computer ratio is 12:1.
6. Average 27.68% of expenditure is incurred on maintenance of infrastructure. The daily cleaning of infrastructure is done by peons and major maintenance is done through necessary Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMCs).

Student Support and Progression

The college always gives the preference to students’ welfare. The college help students to apply for scholarships from both State and Central Governments. College offers financial assistance to students. Engaging a students in a wide variety of co-curricular, extracurricular, cultural and sports activities enhances the overall development, all-rounded and successful citizen with social skills.

1. 72.49% of students have been received scholarships and other benefits. Scholarships and freeships are timely disbursed. The college offers various types of fee concession, bus pass, book bank facility etc., to needy students.
2. The college has organized 32 soft skills, 19 language and communication skills, 19 life skills, and 12 technological awareness programmes to enhance the capabilities of student in the last five years.
3. 82.66% of students participated and benefited from guidance for competitive examinations and career counseling.
4. The college has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances through committees like Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaints Committee and Anti-Ragging Committee. Trained psychological counselors at the Counseling Centre provide support for student’s mental health issues.
5. 30.43% of students placed in Government services and private companies and progressed to higher education in the last five years.
6. 33 students qualified in state/national/ international level examinations during the last five years.
7. 106 awards and medals received in sports and cultural activities during the last five years.
8. 215 number of sports and cultural programs in which students of the Institution participated during last five years.
9. A registered Alumni Association under the Societies Registration Act, of 1860 (ACT XXI of 1860) in 2018, actively involved in various events of the college either as resource persons, or sponsors for extracurricular activities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is run by Vidya Prasarak Mandal (VPM), Gadhinglaj. The management board, CDC, IQAC, Principal, Head of the Departments (HoD), and all staff work together to make teaching, learning, evaluation in effective way. The Institute use e-governance in various area of the operations. The regular Audits are in

process. The institute also provides financial support and encourages faculties for professional development. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) makes sure everything is up to standard.

1. The institute has various 05 statutory committees and 24 working committees for smooth functioning through decentralization and participation in the institutional governance.
2. The institute follows the standard procedure for the appointment and service rules prescribed by the Apex body, Government of Maharashtra and Shivaji University, Kolhapur.
3. The institute Implemented e-governance in areas of Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support, Examination etc.
4. The institution has effective welfare measures like insurance, medical reimbursement, financial assistance and Performance Appraisal System for teaching as well as non-teaching staff
5. 83 faculties are provided financial support to attend conferences/workshops.
6. 115 teaching and non-teaching staff participated in Faculty Development Programs (FDP), Professional Development /Administrative Training Programs.
7. Institution has plans for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds through budget prepared and approved in CDC meeting. College conducts financial audits regularly.
8. IQAC has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes through strategic plan, academic calendar and introducing various development plans. It reviews teaching-learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals.
9. The IQAC adopts processes for quality assurance by training to staff, participating in AISHE, NIRF, AAA and ISO certification. Stakeholder feedback and grievances helps to identify areas for improvement.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college encourages the staff to work on the best practices, aiming to impart knowledge and values to both our students and society. Through various academic programmes and activities, we try to enrich minds and hearts, shaping responsible citizens committed to positive change.

1. 25 Gender equity programs have been organized by Women Development Cell, Internal Complaint Committee and Sachetana Mandal. The counseling cell of our college organized 12 awareness programs.
2. 71 National, International days and festivals were celebrated during last 5 years.
3. The Institution has installed 15KW Solar panel as an alternate energy sources collection.
4. Degradable and non-degradable wastes were collected and disposed with help of Gadhinglaj Municipal Corporation, Gadhinglaj.
5. Rainwater Harvesting System, Electric Vehicle Recharge Station (EVRS) installed in campus.
6. Ramps, Wheelchair and lifts are measures of Disabled-friendly students.
7. College conducted Green audit, Environment audit, Gender audit and Energy audit. 34 activities for clean and green campus initiative have been conducted. 24 programs in beyond the campus environmental promotion activities in last five years.
8. 65 activities were organized, providing an inclusive environment, Students and faculty were sensitized to the constitutional obligations by arranging Voter Awareness, Human Right Day, Constitution Day and Guest lecture on Constitution.
9. 'Promotion of Research Culture' and 'Fostering Social and Environmental Responsibilities in Students' are the two best practices in which institute work more for the benefit of students and society.

10. Activities of GCG-IAPT Anveshika centre is an institutional distinguishness for the scientific work. The centre developed 473 demo experiments. The centre organizes and participated in 56 programmes at different schools and colleges and through these programmes more than 12,000 students and teachers benefited in last five years.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The institution adopts a holistic education model, aligning with the National Education Policy (NEP-2020). 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Dr. Ghali College, affiliated with Shivaji University, Kolhapur, is integrating with the National Academic Depository, part of the Digital India Programme. The National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has been merged into the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform. The University is moving towards adopting a choice-based credit system across all programs, with plans to pass a resolution on ABC within the Academic Council. Once approved, Dr. Ghali College will register with the ABC portal, establishing a centralized student database to store academic credits. This database will facilitate seamless credit transfer for students and be supported by a robust technical system for effective monitoring.
3. Skill development:	The skill development cell actively enhances students' technical, vocational, and soft skills through over 79 Certificate courses in last five years and NSDC courses annually. Our institution prioritizes skill-based education and positivity among learners, offering mentorship to guide students toward future employment opportunities. We focus on nurturing essential skills like creativity, critical thinking, communication, and teamwork, aligning with university directives. Extracurricular activities both on and off-campus are encouraged to develop managerial and interpersonal skills. Value-based education is integral to our ethos, emphasizing humanistic and ethical values such as truth, peace, and citizenship. Specialized courses target school and college dropouts in the college vicinity, enhancing

	their employability.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The National Educational Policy (NEP-2020) will be implemented from the academic year 2023-24, incorporating Indian Knowledge System (IKS) syllabi. Our institution promotes multilingualism, emphasizing proficiency in Marathi, Hindi, and English, and integrates local language, art, and culture in activities to deepen regional connections. Students actively participate in cultural events at the university's Youth Festival, and our magazine, "Shivratna," in English, Marathi, and Hindi, has won Best Magazine Awards for two years. Cultural awareness is enhanced through folk dances and singing in regional languages. Additionally, the Department of Marathi offers a certificate course in Modi Lipi (Ancient Script).
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The institution implements outcome-based education (OBE), utilizing a manual detailing course outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and overall program outcomes. Students are introduced to these outcomes through the curriculum and orientation programs. Affiliated with Shivaji University, Kolhapur, it follows directives, employing various teaching methods like lectures, seminars, and internships to assess outcome attainment. The curriculum, teaching methods, and assessment are aligned with OBE principles, integrating experiential learning like practicals and projects. The curriculum, designed to meet societal needs and NEP guidelines, emphasizes cognitive abilities, ethics, and entrepreneurial skills. Innovative methods such as project-based learning and ICT tools are used in teaching and assessment. Action plans are developed post-evaluation to enhance future outcome attainment.

Each department communicates the syllabus and evaluation pattern to students, ensuring transparency and rigor. Various assessment methods such as Unit tests, tutorials, home assignments, seminars, surprise tests, and group discussions are employed to continuously evaluate and enhance students' learning levels. Teachers ensure that the students are aware of the Internal Assessment Evaluation Criteria.

- **Transparency in the system**

Departmental CIE or formative assessments are conducted by subject teachers during the conceptualization phase, as outlined in the academic diary. Activities like fieldwork, industrial visits, and group research projects are introduced at the departmental level to enrich subject knowledge acquisition. CIE process is completed well in advance of semester examinations, with marks communicated

transparently to students in the classroom.

- **Efficient Mechanism of External Assessment**

University summative assessments adhere to the provided timetable, with both theory and internal examinations conducted for UG and PG courses. The weightage of internal examinations varies for UG and PG courses, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation of students' academic progress. Out of total 50- and 100-marks examinations, internal Examination has the weightage of 10 and 20 marks for UG and PG courses while theory examination 40 for UG and 80 for PG courses respectively.

- **Effective Grievance Redressal System**

Examination Cell collaborates with teachers and administrative staff to ensure the smooth functioning of examinations. Grievance Redressal Committees, both at the college and university levels, address grievances related to summative examinations promptly and seriously. The committee holds two meetings before and after of each semester examination to monitor related issues. Grievances are communicated to the university's examination authority through established channels, and satisfactory solutions are provided within 7 days. Even though, the number of grievances is less these are inevitable and dealt with utmost seriously.

Summative evaluation is done at College level Central Assessment Process for first and second year of UG and University level CAP for all final year and PG level at the end of each semester.

Grievances related to Departmental CIE, all subject teachers, head of the Department and Principal play vital role to resolve the grievances of the students if any and resolve them immediately.

Moreover, to incentivize participation in co-curricular activities, additional marks are awarded to students who excel in activities such as National Service Scheme, and university-conducted physical examinations. These initiatives serve to foster holistic development and encourage active engagement beyond the academic sphere.

The vision and mission of the institute are in alignment with the objectives of the outcome-based education (OBE) system as stipulated by UGC, which are displayed on the college campus and also on

the college website. The principal and teaching faculty frequently highlight the vision, mission, aims, and objectives of the college to the students during their addresses to them in various programs.

The college is affiliated with Shivaji University, Kolhapur, and follows the curricula prescribed by the university. The vision and mission of the institute are in alignment with the objectives of the outcome-based education system. While designing the syllabus of a particular course, the Board of Studies (BoS) of the affiliated university specifies POs, PSOs, and COs that are expected to be achieved by the students who opt for the course. Our college offers 20 UG programs and 9 PG programs. The POs, PSOs, and COs of the respective courses that the college offers are displayed on the website of the college and also on the notice boards of the respective departments. For each program, program outcomes are stated, keeping in view UGC guidelines on graduate attributes. They are based on educational excellence, communication skills, personality and leadership, and global citizenship. In departmental meetings, every teacher is instructed to explain the outcomes of each subject at the beginning of the curriculum. Students are made aware of course outcomes at the beginning of every semester of the academic year during the syllabus discussion. Concerned teachers have been given the responsibility to percolate course outcomes up to the last element in the class.

The college also offers multidisciplinary 73 add-on, COC, skill-oriented, and value-based certificate courses during the assessment period. These need-based courses are self-designed by respective subject experts. In the syllabus of these courses, their outcomes are stated. The COs of these self-designed courses are also displayed on the college website as well as in the respective departments. These course outcomes are kept in focus when implementing and delivering curricular planning, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities for students.

Evaluation of Attainment of Course Outcomes at UG and PG levels

Quality enhancement process of an institution mainly depends upon evaluation of the attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes. Several meetings have been carried out regarding the development of mechanism for the attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes. IQAC has developed the mechanism for the evaluation of program outcomes and course outcomes. The faculty orientation programme was organized in staffroom to understand the developed mechanism and to know the method of calculation of attainments of outcomes.

IQAC developed the mechanism of outcomes attainments are as follows,

CO Attainment Levels

To evaluate CO attainment, IQAC has set the three different levels, based on results of Internal Assessment and Semester End Examinations. The three levels in ascending order includes,

Level 1: 40% of students scored more than class average in the Internal Assessment and Semester End Examinations.

Level 2: 50% of students scored more than class average in the Internal Assessment and Semester End Examinations.

Level 3: 60% of students scored more than class average in the Internal Assessment and Semester End Examinations.

Here as per University Guidelines, the Internal Assessment consist of 20% of attainment and Semester End Examinations consists of 80% of attainment.

IQAC of our institute set to achieve at least **Level 2** for all CO attainments. CO attainment is measured by each department and for any discrepancy remedial measures such as assignments; tutorial and remedial measures shall be planned.

PO Attainment Levels

To evaluate the PO attainment, IQAC has set the five different levels, based on the average attainment level of corresponding courses through formative and summative assessment (Direct Method) and Student Progression and Placement Data (Indirect Method) in ascending order.

PO attainment levels are defined / set as follows:

Level1:Poor $0.5 \leq \text{PO Attainment Value} < 1$

Level2:Average $1 \leq \text{PO Attainment Value} < 1.5$

Level3:Good $1.5 \leq \text{PO Attainment Value} < 2$

Level4:VeryGood $2 \leq \text{PO Attainment Value} < 2.5$

Level5:Excellent $2.5 \leq \text{PO Attainment Value} < 3$

Formula

PO Attainment Level = 80% (Average attainment level by direct method) + 20% (Average attainment level by indirect method)

IQAC of our institute set to achieve at least **Level 4** for all PO attainments, indicates that every department is aiming to achieve very good performance of abilities of students.

Research and Development Programme:

To create ecosystem for innovation, college has taken various initiatives through research and development cell. It includes 116 workshops were organized for the same. One day workshop and guest lecture on IPR have been organized. college has established CFC, through which various initiatives have been carried out in the field of research and development.

The outcome of these programs is 53 UGC approved research papers, 51 books/chapters, 63 research articles in the proceeding were published in various national/international level journals and seminars. 2 minor research projects sanctioned from Shivaji University, Kolhapur under Research Sensitization Scheme. One of our students Vardapgol Laxmikant Basavaraj represents college at State level Avishkar research competition. 15 students from college represent in Avishkar Research Competition at University Level whereas 31 students represent District Level. 9 Research projects of students are also sanctioned by Shivaji University, Kolhapur under Lead College Scheme and Research Sensitization Scheme.

Skill based courses:

The research and development cell guided faculty members to start skill based courses for students. To increase their language and communication skills, soft skills, ICT skills among the students our college has started 36 skill based courses. The library is automated with open-source integrated library management software namely 'NewGenLib'. This software consists modules for various functions, including book circulation with barcode facilities, book accession, library membership management, Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC), and book cataloguing. Additional features such as database management, backup and restore options and book status tracking are easily accessible.

The software is highly beneficial for recording library user attendance digitally and for facilitating computerized circulation of reading materials to both students and faculty members. The R&D Cell circulates the notice in which distribution of ANNUAL SELF-APPRAISAL REPORT forms to the teaching faculty and gives the deadline for the submission with the required documentation.

The faculties fill the ASAR forms and get it sign by respective head of the department and handover it to the committee. Research and Development Cell carries scrutiny of all collected ASAR forms considering valid documentation provided. The ASAR is assessed by the Principal and scrutiny report submitted to IQAC and necessary action is taken for the improvement.

Research committee also personally guide to the faculties which are applying for placements through Career Advancement Scheme after getting the circular for placement by the university. Helping to fill the CAS forms to get themselves placed properly. Faculties are placed in higher grade due to such efficient mechanism.

For the performance of non-teaching staff college makes confidential report of each employee and reported to the higher authority every year. The confidential reports of the employees are kept in the custody of the office superintendent as administrative head of the institute. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The main resources of funds are plan and non-plan grants received from Government of Maharashtra, grants for N.S.S., Student Welfare Fund, Examination grant, EBC and SC/ST scholarship grants, students' fees from Grants-in-Aid and self-financed courses, donations, alumni and research projects.

College prepares its budget for different heads like salary, infrastructure, maintenance, academic expenses, library, Gymkhana, laboratory expenditure and miscellaneous expenses etc. This budget is approved in CDC meeting. The available funds are maintained at college bank account. The college Principal and office watch on timely and proper disbursement of funds. The Heads of the Department and different committees prepare estimates for their respective work and produce it in front of the Principal. These requirements are approved and/or modified in consultation with purchase committee. The purchase of up to Rs. 25000/- is directly done with Principal permission and for purchase of more than Rs. 25000/- quotations are invited and are checked in purchase committee meetings. The lowest quotation is selected but not at the cost of quality. The College identifies and updates different vendors for purchase of books, sports equipment, stationary, chemicals, instruments, furniture, IT infrastructure etc. through rate contract. Various modes such as petty cash, cheques, and online transactions are maintained by separate accounts for specific purposes.

Optimal Utilization of Resource:

Budgetary plan prepared on requirements of all departments. For proper utilization of resources college first discuss with management and then prepares its budget and discussed in the CDC meeting where the allotted amount may vary according to the needs if possible. Infrastructure, ICT and other facilities are

updated from time to time. Purchase Committee works on the details of the budgetary plan. Purchase Committee sanctions the budget by considering financial resources and needs of the departments. The utilization of the sanctioned budget is monitored by Principal and in the meeting of CDC. These practices help optimal utilization of resources.

Internal and External Audits:

College conducts Internal and external financial audits regularly. The external audit is conducted on regular basis by the auditor. Accountant and Office Superintendent take care of the audit. After finalization of audit, a report is submitted by auditors and the errors are informed to the Principal, Office Superintendent and Accountant. Institute has appointed K.M.Doshi and Company, Chartered Accountant, Kolhapur as external auditor. This firm looks in to the final audit of the college.

Daily transactions, grants received, expenditure under various heads is checked and a trial balance with audited statements is submitted to the Sanstha audit office in turn which is given to the college for further process. All the audit notes are informed to the accountant and office superintendent, these queries are resolved before next internal audit is done. As per the norms of Government of Maharashtra Higher and Technical Education Department, the institution conducts its financial audit by Accounts Officer (AO). It is followed by senior auditor, Joint Director Office, Higher Education, Kolhapur and final audit is conducted by Accountant General, Mumbai for salary and non-salary grants received from the government.

Dr. Ghali College Gadhinglaj-Indian Association Science Teachers (GCG-IAPT) Anveshika center is an innovation center to work for Science education and develop demonstrations. It is an innovative laboratory which encourages model-based teaching. It was established in the academic year 2011-12.

The Aims and objective of the center is as follows

Vision

- Science for Education, Exploration Innovation and Application

Aim:

- An ideal and innovative program for UG and school children to inspire, empower and expand their minds to scientific world.

Mission

- Enriching students understanding of concepts in Science through interesting demonstrations
- To stimulate curiosity and also inspire everyone for physic learning by creating fun, memorable experiences.
- We value Science as an indispensable tool for understanding our world inclusiveness and students' lives.

Objectives

- To hear is to forget, to see is to remember, to do is to understand.
- Advancement of science and scientific attitude in rural and hilly areas.
- Progression of scientific knowledge among the people through organizing guest lecture, seminar, symposiums and workshops etc.
- To start an open science laboratory for providing platform to cater the creative strength and promote enhanced scientific activities in the field of Science.

Major Activities Run by Centre:

1. More than 473 Demo experiments developed and presentation for school children and school teachers.
2. Class wise demo and hands on activities developed and taken each year.
3. Science Teachers workshop cum training programme for each year.
4. Workshops on designing experiments for B.Sc. students and training to present demonstrations in front of school children.
5. Each year our B. Sc. Students visit at least 20 schools to present demonstrations.
6. Workshop for school children each year.
7. Sky watching programme and small projects for students.
8. Skill based all India level National Anveshika Experimental Skill Test (NAEST) conducted for each year in two different parts consisting part I for school level (9 to 12) and part II UG and PG level (B.Sc. M.Sc. students).

2018-2019

- National Anveshika Examination NAEST witnessed the participation of 640 students from various parts of Maharashtra. Following a screening test, 130 students advanced to the Prelim Examination, where both school and college-level participants engaged in three experiments at the Anveshika Centre. Three students awarded prestigious Anveshika level prizes, with the first-place winner qualifying for the semi-final and final tests at the SGM Anveshika Centre in Kanpur.
- Centre organized Lok Vigyan Programmes across eight locations, attracting 2411 participants, including students and teachers. These sessions, themed "Science in My Life," comprised five workshops delving into different scientific aspects, supplementing traditional education by fostering interactive learning and real-world application appreciation.
- Science demonstrations programme on Sound, Electricity, Electromagnetism, and Gravitation has been arranged in which 214 students and 7 teachers from 5 schools were participated.
- Centre organised School level Science teacher's workshop. Sky watching programme held at Uttur Vidyalaya Tal. Ajara, benefited 410 students from six different schools.
- Workshop on the Development of Experiments and demonstration models on Sound and Mechanics engaged 75 B.Sc. students.
- A popular lecture cum demonstrations event at Amboli Public School benefited over 300 students from Amboli Public School and nearby institutions.

2019-2020

- In 2019, the National Anveshika Examination NAEST witnessed the participation of 1545 students from Maharashtra. Following a screening test, 203 students advanced to the Prelim Examination.
- The IAPT National Competition on Essay Writing in Science (NCEWP - 2019) organized where 55 participants from student and teacher/science communicator categories participated.
- The GCG-IAPT Anveshika Centre conducted a one-day workshop for B.Sc. II students on "Preparation of Demonstrative models" where 101 students developed Science models based on various concepts.
- Notable initiatives included a solar eclipse observation program in which more than 150 enjoyed the solar Eclipse observation.
- A full-night sky observation workshop organized in New Horizon school. 300 students participated in the programme.

- participation in various scientific events and workshops, furthering the centre's mission of promoting scientific curiosity and engagement.

2020-2021

- During the Corona pandemic in 2020, the GCG-IAPT Anveshika Centre adapted by conducting the online NAEST-2020, attracting 1190 students for the screening test. The competition, comprising a video-based screening test followed by a preliminary examination. 150 students selected for the preliminary stage.
- However, programs scheduled between June and November were halted due to the lockdown.
